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Moving Closer to Foster Care

In the last speech he would give, Martin Luther King, Jr. famously alluded to the parable of the Good Samaritan:

"The first question which the Priest and Levite asked was, 'If I stop to help this man, what will happen to me?' The Samaritan reversed the question: 'If I do not stop to help this man, what will happen to him?'"

It's doubtful that any of us have had to ask this question about a man on the road to Jericho. All of us, though, have had to choose which of these questions to ask. We have all stood in view of broken people and difficult situations, forced to contemplate whether or not to move closer. When it comes to the state of the child welfare system, the Church has the same question to answer: Move on or move closer?

Author and activist Jason Johnson writes, "The irony of perspective is that for some on the outside looking in, foster care seems too risky to do; yet for those on the inside - having deeply felt the complexities of beauty and brokenness and joy and sorrow - the risks that come with *not* doing it are simply too great to ignore."

From the context of Jesus' first telling of the parable to the time of MLK, God's people have heard the call to consider the needs of others, even before their own.

For Jesus, the choice of the Samaritan to stop and render aid, provide care, sacrifice for the good of another, was not only the answer to the question "Who is my neighbor?" It was also an illustration of what is required of those who wish to inherit eternal life.

The God Who Draws Near

God has always desired to be a God-with-us. His nearness to





humankind is evident from the moment of creation. Even when this relationship is fractured by sin, God is committed to His redemptive purpose of drawing as near as possible to us. In other words, He refuses to simply pass by or move on.

His presence was close from the start. He led His people by cloud and fire (Exodus 13:21) to find their way when they were lost. When God could not get people to move any closer, He came to them.

With specific instructions for Moses, the tabernacle of the Lord became a tangible place for His glory to dwell. At the sacrifices of Aaron, the glory of the Lord appeared before all of the people (Leviticus 9:23-24). In the temple of Solomon, that same presence moved in and filled that house (2 Chronicles 7:1). But a new temple was coming, the prophets would say, and in that day God's Spirit and glory would come to live among us all. John called Jesus "the radiance"

Yet, Jesus makes sure to tell the disicples that when He leaves, God will be closer still. In their moment of need – in our moment of need – Jesus was not primarily concerned with what would happen to Him. He asked, instead, what will happen to them? This is the love that led Him to the cross.

Jesus tells the disciples that the Holy Spirit will come to them when He's gone. It must have been hard to imagine that God could move any closer than right there with them. What could be closer? They would later learn that by believing in Jesus, God would come to live inside of them, forever (John 14:15-31).

The story of God's presence, the life of Jesus, and the gift of the Holy Spirit reveal much to us about who God is and who we are called to be. God chooses to enter into our brokenness and allow Himself to be broken by it, so that we don't have to be broken any more. At every turn, God sees the plight of His people and is determined to move closer. This is what He did for us. He invites us to do the same for others.

The People Who Move Closer

For centuries, faithful Christians have answered this call in a myriad of ways. Refusing to simply "pass by,"

God's people have moved toward the broken people and difficult places in our world, again and again. This is, after all, the pattern set by the life of God Himself.

In his book, *The Rise of Christianity*, sociologist Rodney Stark offers analysis of how Christianity rapidly flourished in the ancient world. He argues that "the primary means of its growth was through the united and motivated efforts of the growing numbers of Christian believers, who invited their friends, relatives, and neighbors to share the 'good news.'"

Stark describes many advantages that this closelyknit network of believers offered to the surrounding world:

"To cities filled with the homeless and the impoverished, Christianity offered charity as well as hope. To cities filled with newcomers and strangers, Christianity offered an immediate basis for attachments. To cities filled with orphans and widows, Christianity provided a new and expanded sense of family. To cities torn by violent ethnic strife, Christianity offered a new basis for social solidarity. And to cities faced with epidemics, fires, and earthquakes, Christianity offered effective nursing services."

From the start, followers of Jesus discovered that their love of God and neighbor meant that they had to move toward hard places. This distinguishing characteristic of God is a distinctive characteristic of who we are, too. It was not just what they did. In light of the gospel, it's who we are.

Jason Johnson writes that, "The world around us tells us to avoid, isolate, and insulate ourselves from anything that's potentially hard, uncomfortable, or dangerous. We're indoctrinated in all forms to set up the kind of life where we can live the rest of our days pretending like hard places and broken people

don't exist around us - in our city, around the world or even across the street. Make things as easy and comfortable as possible. At all costs. [...]

"Fear keeps a lot of good people away from a lot of great kids and families - and ultimately deprives

STEP 4: CHURCHES AND COMMUNITY MEMBERS PARTNER TO ENSURE THAT THE CHILD AND FAMILY IS HELPED everyone of the beauty that can only be found when we move toward those unique places of uncertainty and necessity - where we're not sure how this whole thing is going to play out, but we're absolutely certain that we have to do something about it. We simply can't not. This isn't to say you should be careless and foolish. It is to say, however, that you should deeply and realistically assess the costs you will incur if you do foster, but never to the neglect of considering what it will cost these kids if you don't."

That is the difference between the two who passed by and the Samaritan who stopped and moved closer. One asked the question from the proper perspective.

The church today has a tremendous responsibility to remain engaged in the child welfare crisis. There are numerous ways to get involved, such as assisting with the needs of kinship care, supporting aged out youth, or becoming a part of the village of support needed by foster families. However, the need for open and capable foster homes remains at the center.

When Jesus asked which one was a neighbor, the expert in the law answered, "The one who showed mercy toward him."

Then Jesus said to him, "Go and do the same."

DID YOU KNOW?

When children are removed from their home by Child Protective Services (CPS), they are placed into **Substitute Care**. CPS's goal is settings until they can safely reunite with their family, achieve permanency with their

In our region (Region 1), encompassing 41 Panhandle counties, 68% of the children in Substitute Care are placed in Non-Kinship Care, the home of a non-relative. At the end

- Undergo a home study.

This process can take 6-18 months, but with one step at a time, you can move closer to foster care.

Computer Ministry Sharing Hope

First Baptist donations find purpose through local partnership

In April of 2022, Tommy Hill contacted Sharing Hope Ministry to see if there was a need for refurbished computers. Tommy was active with First Baptist Church's Computer Ministry, and his call was an answer to prayers.

Sharing Hope is a local ministry whose mission is to assist at-risk and incarcerated women in changing their story by sharing hope through Christ's love. Sharing Hope Ministry sends the Life Recovery Bible, Bible studies, and prayer correspondence to women residing in correctional and addiction rehabilitation facilities nationwide. Locally, programs include the Lucille and Leo Caiafa, Jr. Center for Advancement, an outreach ministry that provides classes, recovery groups, and meeting space, in addition to offering emergency food, clothing, and hygiene items for women who have been released from prison or jail.

Sharing Hope also operates Patsy's Place, a Christ-centered transitional home in Amarillo where volunteers



and staff nurture and mentor women as they cope with overwhelming obstacles upon release from county jail or prison.

Computer classes were about to begin at the Lucille and Leo Caiafa, Jr. Center for Advancement and were being taught by Goodwill Industries. The classes are offered to women in other Amarillo shelters and then opened up to at-risk women in the Amarillo community who are lacking the basic skills necessary to function in today's society.

Sarah was one of the ladies who was living in a local shelter, and she was trying to get back on her feet after an unexpected situation left her homeless. Sarah had recently been offered a wonderful job, but she needed computer skills and her own computer before she could start the job. Sarah was one of the first women to receive a refurbished computer from First Baptist Church.

Maria was another woman who took the first step to improving her situation by attending the computer class. She was nervous about entering a classroom setting since she dropped out of school in the ninth grade. Maria flourished in this environment and was thrilled when she received her Certificate of





Completion and her computer.

Maria was so empowered by her success that she has recently begun attending the G.E.D. prep classes that are also offered at the Center for Advancement.

Tommy participates in the training by attending the last computer class to teach the women how to navigate their computers and the free software that allows them to get started without additional costs. The graduating women are also given free USB wireless Wi-Fi adapters. Jessica, a recent graduate of the Patsy's Place program, started her first semester at Amarillo College this fall and was able to enroll in online classes due to receiving one of these free computers.

The impact of the partnership with First Baptist Church, Goodwill Industries, and Sharing Hope Ministry has been amazing. Since April of 2022, forty-eight women have learned important computer skills and have received their own refurbished computer which allows them to take the next step to self-sufficiency.

We made sure that we had a servant's heart, because that is what we were there to do. That is what God calls us to do. I also got to do a lot of painting, and David Nance did a great job showing us how to lead a group in the short amount of time. I had a great time getting to paint and listening to Jake Chapman's famous Spotify playlist, "Hype for Jesus." While painting, the bond and teamwork of this youth group really came to light. Without it, I wouldn't have had the amount of fun that I had, and the job, most likely, wouldn't have gotten done in time.

On the last night of the trip, it is

Tools For Ministry College Groups Grow and Serve

Just south of Colorado Springs, in the Fountain Valley, sits Mountain View Bible Church. As a recent church plant, they've been serving their community together for less than two years. Within the last year, an opportunity arrived to move into a permanent church building. The building is located in the middle of several neighborhoods, within walking distance of an elementary school, and near the local high school. The building complex had been a church and daycare several decades ago.

While the building is a wonderful gift, it had room for updates. Some reconfiguration was needed to serve the congregation and community safely and effectively. In partnership with the students from Northside Baptist Church in Weatherford, TX, the First Baptist Amarillo college ministry was able to offer



just that. Comprised of college students on their Spring Break, the group spent a week on several construction projects, including installing new windows, redesigning a stage, building a new sound booth, cleaning up a playground, making Dutch doors for the church's children's department, building picnic tables for an outdoor courtyard, and rebuilding two storage sheds.

The students didn't go with construction experience and knowledge, but they did go motivated to love on brothers

and sisters in Christ at MVBC and to support them as they serve. They went willing to learn and develop new skills. Their work helped elevate the building from a burden to a tool. The student crews were led by an incredible group of adults sharing their skills, humility, time, and experience with the Lord. Each evening they had the opportunity to worship together with members of MVBC.

This year, especially, was really great, because one of the girls that was in my small group the first year we went was able to come back as a leader.

I also want to share a story about one of the residential boys whom we've become really close to and grown to love more and more every year.

When we first arrived at Dar El Awlad (DEA) on Sunday afternoon to set up and decorate for a Vacation Bible School, the residential boys were thrilled to see us. They were running out to give us hugs, and they already knew us by name. We could see the lasting impact of the church's continuous support of DEA right then. Something special happened with one boy, in particular. He raced back up to his room to grab something to show us. For what it was, I was really impressed how quickly he found it.

When he returned, he was showing us a "Spark Studios" themed craft (the previous year's camp theme). It was a yellow foam prayer journal, made and given to him by a team member a year before. of getting to see us in person to share them with us again.

Additionally, from the time we arrived he loved showing me VBS song moves he remembered from 2022 and even back to 2019, four years ago. He was also so eager to learn more songs and more scripture as he participated in the "Twists and Turns" VBS we had this year.

Seeing how he was able to remember God's Word through song so much time later showed me the lasting impact of our presence in Lebanon.
